

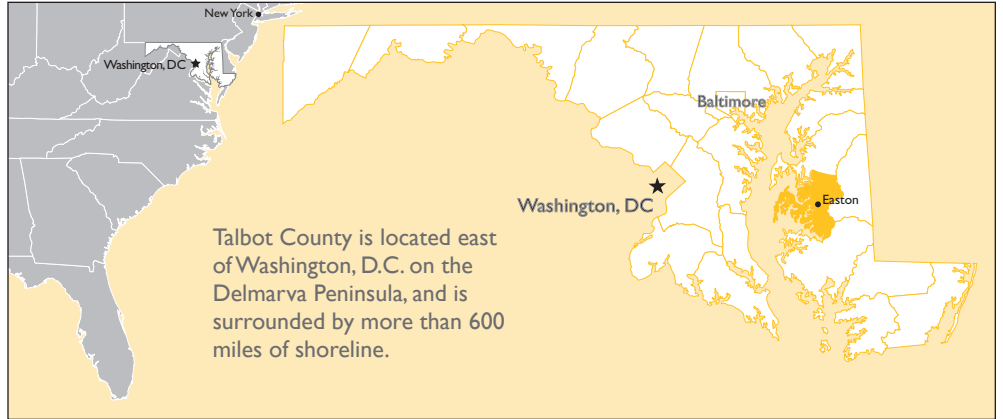
Brief Economic Facts

TALBOT COUNTY, MARYLAND

Talbot County, strategically positioned on Maryland's Eastern Shore and just 70 miles from Washington, D.C., and Baltimore, offers a prime environment for business expansion with the state's lowest real property tax rate and second-lowest income tax rate. The county is experiencing targeted growth across key industries, including healthcare, financial services, aquaculture, and transportation, while maintaining its reputation as a premier tourist destination.

The new University of Maryland Shore Regional Medical Center in Easton, opening in 2028, will serve as a regional healthcare hub, creating jobs and driving business development in medical services. The financial sector is anchored by Shore United Bank, the fourth-largest bank in Maryland, reinforcing the county's position as a financial services center.

Talbot County's maritime economy continues to evolve through the Tilghman Wharf blue catfish processing facility, which addresses environmental challenges while opening new market opportunities, and Ferry Cove Oyster Hatchery, a leader in aquaculture innovation and commercial production.

BUSINESS AND INDUSTRIAL PROPERTY⁶

Talbot County offers eight business parks and five commercial shopping centers, all located in Easton. The Town of Easton provides for water and sewer capacity, high-speed internet, cable, electric and natural gas. The business parks are immediately accessible to U.S. Route 50 with links to U.S. Routes 301 and 13 for north/south transport and I-97 and I-95 for access to Mid-Atlantic markets.

The Easton Technology Center is located adjacent to the Easton Airport and offers Class A office space on two- to three-acre sites with bundled parcels available up to 60 acres. Trappe, located on U.S. Route 50 in the southern area of the county, is poised for commercial infill and industrial development.

TRANSPORTATION

Highways: U.S. 50.

Rail: Rail sidings are not currently available in Talbot County; however, the Maryland & Delaware Railroad operates feeder lines out of Centreville and Federalsburg that connect to Norfolk Southern in Delaware

Truck: More than 100 local and long-distance trucking establishments are located on the Upper Eastern Shore

Water: Served by the Port of Baltimore with a 50' channel; a leading U.S. automobile and break-bulk port; the Mid-Shore region is also served by the Port of Seaford, Delaware on the Nanticoke River with barge off-loading capabilities for grain and aggregate

Air: Served by Baltimore/Washington International Thurgood Marshall Airport (BWI) and Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport; Easton Airport offers charter service to Washington, D.C. and Baltimore, shuttle service to BWI and Amtrak, general aviation services (4000' and 5500' runways); state-of-the-art fueling system and control tower are part of a \$15 million improvement project

RECREATION AND CULTURE

Recreation: Talbot County Community Center provides sports fields, indoor ball court, and professional-size rinks for curling, hockey and figure skating; the county maintains Hog Neck Golf Course and 29 public boat ramps and marine slips; YMCA offers two Olympic-size pools, tennis courts, ball fields, racquet ball and squash courts, rock climbing and fitness training.

Water Activities: Five navigable river systems attract competitive and leisure sailors and boaters from throughout the Mid-Atlantic region; Tred Avon and Miles River Yacht Clubs provide transient dockage and fuel along with several privately held marinas and boat yards; the county is home to a working fleet of crabbers and oyster-dredging skipjacks as well as the renowned log canoe racing sailboats; Oxford played host to the 2018 Star Class Sailing World Championship.

Golf: Hog Neck Golf Course and Talbot County Country Club in Easton; Links at Perry Cabin in St. Michaels.

Cultural and Historical: Easton's Avalon Theatre provides year round entertainment; Academy Art Museum houses impressive collections; Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum in St. Michaels hosts exhibits on Chesapeake Bay maritime heritage; Tilghman Watermen's Museum preserves the stories and work of local waterman; and the Rural Life Museum of Trappe celebrates homes, farms and industry of the area.

Arts & Entertainment District: Easton

Events: The Waterfowl Festival, held in Easton the second weekend in November, enjoys an international reputation for waterlife artwork and conservation investment; Tilghman Island Day celebrates the heritage of the area's watermen while the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum hosts several festivals including the Small Craft and Wooden Boat Festivals and OysterFest; Chesapeake Chamber Festival offers chamber music venues in and around Easton; the Plain Air Easton Art Festival has grown into the largest, most successful outdoor art competition in the country.

UTILITIES

Electricity: Choptank Electric Cooperative, Delmarva Power (Pepco), and Easton Utilities; customers of investor-owned utilities and major cooperatives may choose their electric supplier

Gas: Easton Utilities delivers natural gas to the town of Easton; Sharp Energy, a Chesapeake Utility company, delivers pipeline propane gas

Water: Municipal systems in Easton, Oxford, St. Michaels and Trappe; the remainder of the county's water needs are supplied by wells fed by deep aquifers

Sewer: Municipal systems serve Easton, Oxford and Trappe; county-owned systems serve St. Michaels and Tilghman

Telecommunications: Verizon Maryland is the largest provider of communications services; Easton Utilities Commission provides triple redundant high-speed FTTP and cable to the town of Easton; Comcast is a cable provider in the region; Maryland Broadband Cooperative PoP is located in Easton
